Life Is Calling

The water and wastewater industry needs you.

Current projections anticipate a wave of retirements among those currently working in water and wastewater treatment plants.

By 2020, up to half of these experienced personnel are expected to retire, leaving existing plants with significant gaps among their operators, technicians, managers, and others. In the Bay Area alone, at least 677 new and replacement water and wastewater workers will be needed in the next 5 years.





What is BACWWE?

The Bay Area Consortium for Water and Wastewater Education (BACWWE) is a group of Bay Area industry partners who have joined forces with educators at Solano Community College to provide state-of-the-art education for the next generation of water and wastewater professionals.

Who can take BACWWE courses?

BACWWE partners' employees have priority in registering for classes, but the classes are open to anyone who completes the program requirements below.

Students have to take a math assessment test and register for the program through Solano Community College.

How does BACWWE work?

BACWWE industry partners support the program by covering students' costs (for classes, textbooks, and class supplies), providing high-quality instructors who know the industry and Bay Area agencies, and hosting internships and other opportunities that may lead to the win-win scenario of qualified graduates placed with the local employers who need them most.

What classes and degrees are offered?

The BACWWE program offers the same classes, credits, and Certificate of Achievement and Associate in Science (AS) degree that the Solano Community College Water and Wastewater Technology program does. BACWWE classes are offered in the evening at facilities throughout the Bay Area, at no cost to students.
